## **Distributing Infant Feeding Supplies**

When new donations come in AND at least monthly (more often if high turnover):

◯ Discard / Throw Away:
<ul> <li>Formula and baby food that is expired, or will expire this month. Consider discarding those that will expire next month, especially if your site serves few babies and young children.</li> <li>Formula and baby food with damaged, dented, bloated, or opened containers or those with broken interior or exterior seals.</li> <li>Used infant feeding items (teats, bottles, all pump parts). When possible, distribute only new feeding items. Used electric pumps can be picked up by the SAFE team - some can be reused, depending on brand.</li> <li>Powdered or liquid infant formula that has been exposed to extreme heat or freezing, as this may alter nutrient availability/stability and container integrity.</li> <li>Concentrated formula (liquid formula that says "ADD WATER" - often in small cans) as these are often not prepared safely and lack clear instructions.</li> </ul>
Discard formula in a secured waste receptacle to ensure that unsafe product will not be accessed by others and fed to babies.
Mark & Organize Feeding Supplies for Best Safety
□ Write expiration dates on the top and front of formula containers with a permanent marker (i.e. EXP: Jan/26)
<b>●●</b> Put in the Front / In the Most Immediate View
<ul> <li>"Ready-to-feed" Formula (liquid, already prepared formula).</li> <li>NEW teats/bottle nipples and bottles. Place them next to the liquid "ready-to feed" formula.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Place safe water near powdered formula.</li> <li>NEW electric or manual breast pumps and place them in the most immediate view with the "ready-to-feed" formula.</li> </ul>
Move These Items to Other Areas
To decrease risk of families selecting an inappropriate item.  For Older Children - toddler formula, formula for age 1+, dry milk powder  Medical Foods/Products - tube feeding products/sole-source nutrition,
thickeners, Pediasure, Ensure Consider holding excess formula and <b>specialty formulas</b> (i.e. Nutramigen) in the back, with a sign near the formula station indicating they are available if your community would be comfortable asking for what they need.
Inform Caregivers  Post the "Safe Infant Feeding Tips for Families" poster near the formula.
<ul> <li>Breastfeeding &amp; Human Milk</li> <li>If human milk is labeled with donor's contact information, please contact the NCBfC SAFE Team to support informed milk sharing.</li> <li>If human milk is unlabeled and/or thawed, please discard.</li> <li>For those seeking human breast milk, donor milk may be available. Contact us.</li> <li>You can support breastfeeding by having a private area available for lactation and signs pointing to this space.</li> </ul>
